Getting the most from your membership



The Contingency Plan On the Beach and Resilience

THE CONTINGENCY PLAN

The Contingency Plan is a pair of linked plays about the possible effects of climate change in the future. These days it is hard to find climate change deniers. After many decades science has generally prevailed in the public debate, and it's probably only conspiracy theorists who still argue that the changes in the climate and weather we see and hear of almost every day are only random accidents.

But that does not mean that the debate is over. If we follow the news, we know that there are emerging developments reported almost daily. Some news is good, in the sense that we have made some small progress in reducing carbon emissions or lessening the harm to the planet. Some news is superficially encouraging, as governments introduce new laws to try and reduce emissions, or the world comes together at annual COP conferences to make resolutions, which may or may not be legally binding. But such news is at the same time generally disappointing as there is almost never any indication as to how these targets are to be achieved in practice, if indeed they are achievable at all.

But the majority of the news we receive is bad. Climate change is progressing faster than we predict, targets are looking increasingly unachievable or have already failed. No one is moving fast enough. Yet we must manage this emergency without destroying the world economy. Lives will be lost across the planet, especially in poorer countries, if we do too much as well as too little.

So the debate moves on to resilience, a theme highlighted in *The Contingency Plan*. Should we be putting all our efforts into reducing carbon emissions and global temperatures, or should we be planning how to survive their effects? Do we keep on working to keep average temperature rise below 1.5 degrees by 2050, or should we rather be preparing for our failure to do so? Neither Will Paxton nor Colin Jenks thinks we should give up on our mission; but they have different ideas on resilience – what do we need to do now to protect ourselves from the natural (or anthropogenic) disasters that we are already experiencing and can only happen more frequently?

The Contingency Plan gives us both frightening fact and credible fiction. Steve Waters has researched the science around melting ice in the Antarctic, and it's all real and up to date. The predictions that Will Paxton makes (and which come true) are not fantasy; the fiction is simply that they are likely to happen any day now rather than at a more comforting distance in the future. No climate scientist will say the event in the second act of these two plays can never happen at all. The only question is when.

And by asking us to believe in it happening "almost now" Steve Waters both raises the dramatic tension and reinforces the message. This requires the plays to be credibly up to date both in terms of the science and the politics. *The Contingency Plan* was first performed at the Bush Theatre in 2009, but that version is now way out of date. As luck would have it, a revised version was performed at the Crucible Theatre in Sheffield in the autumn of 2022, and we have been able to take that version. But even so, with Steve's permission, we have had to update it further for 2023. If, as I hope, these plays will continue to be performed in coming years, constant revision will be required.

You will be reading this on the occasion of your visit to see your first of the two plays that make up *The Contingency Plan*. I very much hope that you will be coming to see the other play as well. They are both contrasting and complementary. While each play stands alone in itself, they are designed to be seen in conjunction with each other, and only by seeing both will you get the whole story, and appreciate the whole impact. So to whet your appetite, or fill in the gaps if you are unable to return, here is a brief résumé.

Robin Paxton was once an eminent glaciologist. In 1979 he and Colin Jenks led a scientific survey to Antarctica and produced a report setting out a hypothesis that although there were signs of melting ice, the Antarctic ice sheet was stable overall. Soon afterwards, Robin had a something of a breakdown, and retired, now living with his wife Jenny on the shore of the Wash, and devoting his life to the study of the local landscape, flora and fauna.

40 years later, his son Will is also a glaciologist, and has been studying ice in Antarctica for the last two and a half years. He has noticed exponential ice melt, and believes that this will lead almost imminently to rising sea levels and catastrophic flooding, years sooner than other scientists have predicted. He has recently met Sarika, who as a senior civil servant in the Department for Energy Security and Net Zero (DESNEZ) went on a government fact-finding mission to the Antarctic.

They have started a relationship, and she has persuaded him to return early to the UK to reveal his findings to the government and become her department's official adviser. Together they visit his parents in Norfolk, where Robin reveals to Will for the first time the story behind his sudden retirement and professional isolation. But the emotionally fragile Robin is vehemently anti-government and appalled at Will's intended career move. This leads to a massive argument and fight.

At the same time, Sarika receives news of a major flood event in Bristol, which has left over 58 people dead, and she and Will hurry back to London. The next morning we find that the prime minister has overnight turned DESNEZ into the Department for Resilience, and appointed Christopher Casson as the Secretary of State for Resilience, but also moved Tessa Fortnum from the Home Office to be its Minister of State, without properly defining their respective roles, leaving them in competition with each other.

At 8.00 am that Sunday morning, an emergency meeting is held, involving the two ministers, Sarika and Colin Jenks who has for the last fourteen years been the department's chief scientific adviser on climate change. He has produced a report, setting out a proposed course of action, but argues that there needs to be no overall change of policy as a result of the Bristol event. However Sarika introduces Will, who gives a much more alarmist message and urges radical action. Will has also learned from his father that the 1979 report was seriously flawed and misleading and blames Jenks for putting government action back by 40 years. By the end of the meeting, Chris has fired Jenks and appointed Will in his place.

Five months later, in September of the same year, government action has stalled – Chris has effectively procrastinated on all the advice Will has given. But a massive storm is now heading down the east coast of Britain, threatening to cause flooding to coastal areas on a scale never seen before. As Robin and Jenny sit over their dinner in Norfolk, waiting for it to arrive, Tessa, Chris, Will and Sarika are boxed up in London, hopelessly fighting over whether to initiate evacuation procedures. Meanwhile Will is desperately trying to contact his parents...

Here comes the flood.

Katarzyna Kryńsk - Set Designer


