

# **Little Dorrit**

by David Hovatter after Charles Dickens

The Judi Dench Playhouse

20 - 28 January 2023

# **LITTLE DORRIT**

Dickens' novel is set in London around the 1820s when the Marshalsea Debtors' Prison still existed (where Dickens' own family were imprisoned for a while) and which plays a vital part in the novel. The titular character is born there and, twenty years later, after her family are released from the prison, returns there to nurse her friend, Arthur Clennam (who has been important in helping her family restore their wealth), who has himself been imprisoned there for debt. The book feels very Victorian in its austerity and seriousness.

So why relocate the story to 1904 and to a hill station in India?

Originally I was going to do a straightforward adaptation of the novel, but it was seeing *India Gate* (the joint enterprise between The Questors and the Punjabi Theatre Academy) in the Playhouse last year and being impressed at how expressive and sensitive the Indian actors were that made me want to work with Indian actors, and try to work out how to combine Dickens and Indian culture. It's not that well known that both his sons served in the army in India, one of whom is buried in Kolkata (Calcutta). After the Indian Mutiny in 1857, Dickens wrote extremely inflammatory remarks about India and its people, and consequently is seen by some as having racist views.

I knew that there had been a recent film adaptation of *David Copperfield* with an Indian actor as the lead, but the more I thought about India the more I realised how ignorant I was about how and why Britain ended up colonising it, exploiting its wealth and its resources, and also pretty much shaped the modern India we know of today, laying down its railways and cultivating its democracy. I had also recently watched the BBC series about three hill stations in India and was again intrigued at the legacy of the colonial days that still survive, and wondered what it must have been like when the British travelled by train to these remote places to escape the heat of an Indian summer.

Dickens' novel explores and satirises society in a pre-Victorian London; I wanted to explore and comment on colonial society in Edwardian India. The more I learnt about the Raj and what India was like under British rule, the more I could see how the characters in *Little Dorrit* might adapt themselves from living near the Thames to living 7,000 feet above sea level in the Himalayas.

The biggest hurdle was replacing the Marshalsea prison. Such a prison didn't exist in India and it would be difficult to find an equivalent family of a certain caste becoming imprisoned. Luckily I still had vivid memories of one of Satyajit

Ray's films called *The Music Room* based on the short story by Tarasankar Bandyopadhyay, in which an Indian noble, living alone in his large mansion (with only a handful of servants), decides to hold a music concert in his long-abandoned music room to satisfy his jealousy of his nouveau riche neighbour who holds weekly concerts that blare loudly and stir dormant memories of his once illustrious past.

I thought it could work that the Dorrit father was a prince who had lost his inheritance and privileges that would have been handled by the Raj and who lives in a crumbling and gloomy mansion with his family, unable to cope with his loss of prestige and wealth, and relying on his daughter to keep him fed and clothed.

The hero of the book, Arthur Clennam, is a much older man in the book than in my version, and I found myself drawing on Kipling's life in India for much of what has shaped Arthur's character. I've had to drop many interesting characters and, in most cases, slightly alter the personalities of the remaining characters to make them fit more the types of colonial Brits I encountered during my research.

I like physical theatre, so I knew I was going to try to use movement sequences to tell parts of the story rather than words, and I decided to use a mixture of Western music, and a jazz-influenced range of Indian music, rather than the traditional sitar that typically is our access to things Indian.

I was able to invite a number of Indian actors to audition through an Indian casting company that were, by chance, using The Questors one day, to recruit new members. All of the Indian actors you will see tonight are new to The Questors and it has been a great privilege to work with them.

This is a very different, very untypical approach to Dickens, but while I've played around with the style and substance of Dickens' great novel, I've always felt it to be a love story, and, at the end of the day, that is what I hope you will take from our unorthodox telling of *Little Dorrit*.

# **Biographies**

#### Omar Aga - Mr Merdle

#### **David Hovatter - Director**


