The Herd

THE HERD

I first came across *The Herd* ten years ago when I saw the original production at the Bush Theatre. Rory Kinnear is widely known as the award-winning actor who wrote this play using his own experience of growing up with an absent (in his case deceased) father and a severely disabled sister. My favourite plays are plays about family relationships and the conflicts and dramas that emerge from those dynamics. For that reason *The Herd* was a play that immediately spoke to me and I'm delighted to have been asked to direct it.

The play introduces Carol whose husband Ian walked out on her 16 years ago leaving her with their 17-year-old daughter Claire and profoundly mentally and physically disabled 5-year-old son Andy. She has struggled to meet Andy's care needs on her own and is now relying on help from an underfunded care sector. The play begins as Carol and her daughter are preparing for a small family gathering to celebrate Andy's 21st birthday. They are waiting for Carol's elderly parents and Andy to arrive but the gathering is interrupted by some unexpected guests who put Carol's best laid plans into jeopardy. There are no heroes or villains in this play. These are ordinary people trying and struggling to cope with very human experiences. The characters sometimes engage in actions and words which may seem terrible to an audience but they are always steeped in the truth of these interactions. This is a play about a family in crisis but it is also a play about the complexities of human behaviour, love and forgiveness, or at least the possibility of it.

Andy is often talked about in the play but is never seen. He and his disability loom large and the difficulties of caring for his needs are always present. His family are clearly in an economic position to be able to afford him a comfortable life but this is not the case for a lot of disabled people and their families. Disabled people are among those who have been disproportionately affected by austerity and reforms to the welfare system and the inequalities experienced by them are well-documented. The independent think tank Resolution Foundation found that people with disabilities had an available amount to spend that was about 44% lower than that of other working-age adults, up to a third of adults in the lowest-income households having a disability, compared with fewer than a tenth of those in the richest homes. 60% of those who died from Covid-19 in the first year of the pandemic were disabled. The health inequalities that disabled

people already faced were made worse by the pandemic and a decade of austerity. People with learning disabilities were eight times more likely to die of Covid-19 than the general population.

The number of disabled peoples' organisations in England has also declined significantly in recent years as a result of government funding cuts, reducing their capacity to tackle the structural inequalities facing disabled people.

Rory Kinnear

Rory Kinnear is well known as an Olivier Award winning actor of both stage and screen. His triumphs are too numerous to list, but he will be familiar to many for his role as Bill Tanner in the most recent run of *James Bond* films.

Rory was born in Hammersmith and schooled in East Sheen and Barnes. His father, of course, was the ever popular character actor and comedian, Roy Kinnear, and his mother, Carmel Cryan, may be remembered as Charlie Slater's love interest, Brenda Boyle, in *EastEnders* of old. Roy died when Rory was 10.

Rory's family also included two elder sisters: Kirsty and Karina. Karina was quadriplegic, had learning difficulties and required constant care. Sadly she died of Covid-19 at the age of 48 during the 2020 lockdown. Her funeral was held on the same day as a Downing Street garden party. Rory wrote very movingly about the experience in a *Guardian* article that can still be found online.


Andrew Whadcoat – Lighting Designer

DRAGON'S TEETH

Receiving its UK premier at The Questors in 1933, *Dragon's Teeth* was the first production at our Mattock Lane site. This season, we're bringing back to the stage this lost classic of experimental theatre just 90 years after its original production.
