

BLITHE SPIRIT

by Noël Coward

The Judi Dench Playhouse

27 September - 5 October 2024

BLITHE SPIRIT

"Hail to thee, blithe Spirit! / Bird thou never wert"

To a Skylark by Shelley

Born in 1899, Noël Coward became one of the most prolific and celebrated playwrights of the 20th century. By the age of 40, he had penned more than 40 plays, including the timeless classics *Hay Fever* (1924), *Private Lives* (1929), *Design for Living* (1932) and *Present Laughter* (1939). However, the outbreak of war that year prompted Coward to declare he wouldn't write another play 'for the duration' He shifted his focus away from the theatre, seeking to contribute to the war effort instead.

Initially, Coward was tasked with running the British propaganda office in Paris, though he famously quipped, "If His Majesty's Government plans to bore the Germans to death, I don't think we have the time." He spent much of the war travelling extensively, particularly to the USA, rallying support for the Allies. Critics, however, accused him of living lavishly while soldiers fought and died. What they didn't know was that Coward was working secretly for British intelligence; King George V even sought to knight him for his services, but Winston Churchill had other plans.

Churchill recognised that Coward's greatest weapon was his wit and charisma, not espionage. "Go and sing to them when the guns are firing, that's your job!" he instructed. And so, Coward launched into an exhausting series of concert tours to entertain the troops, performing his new wartime songs, such as London Pride and Don't Let's Be Beastly to the Germans.

By 1941, Coward's London office had been destroyed in the Blitz. Seeking refuge and inspiration, he took a brief holiday in Portmeirion with his old friend, Joyce Carey. While Carey considered writing a play about Keats, Coward revisited an idea that had long intrigued him: a play about ghosts. Originally, Coward imagined a haunted house in Paris filled with spirits from different eras, but this concept never materialized. Instead, sitting on the beach in Portmeirion, *Blithe Spirit* was born.

"We sat on the beach, backs against the sea wall, discussing my idea for hours," Coward later recalled. "Keats, I regret to say, was not mentioned." By lunchtime, the title, characters, and a rough outline had emerged. The very next morning, he sat down at his typewriter and, within six days,

he had completed *Blithe Spirit: A Light Comedy in Three Acts.* Coward admitted, without false modesty, "I knew it was witty, I knew it was well-constructed, and I knew it would be a success."

And a success it was. Just six weeks after finishing the script, *Blithe Spirit* premiered at the Opera House in Manchester before transferring to London's Piccadilly Theatre on July 2, 1941. The original cast featured Fay Compton as Ruth, Cecil Parker as Charles, Kay Hammond as Elvira and the incomparable Margaret Rutherford as Madame Arcati. Though one disgruntled audience member shouted "Rubbish!" from the Dress Circle, most critics were enthralled. Graham Greene called it a "weary exhibition of bad taste", but otherwise the reviews were glowing. The play ran for an astonishing four and a half years, making it the longest-running comedy in British theatre — a record it held for 30 years until *Boeing-Boeing* came along.

In 1945, *Blithe Spirit* was adapted for the screen, directed by David Lean, who had previously worked with Coward on the wartime film *In Which We Serve*. The movie starred Rex Harrison as Charles, Constance Cummings as Ruth, Kay Hammond reprising her role as Elvira and Margaret Rutherford once again stealing the show as Madame Arcati. Though Coward was displeased with certain changes in the film, particularly a major plot alteration, the film found success and is still widely beloved.

Yet, it is on stage where *Blithe Spirit* has truly thrived. Over the years, some of the finest actors of our time have taken on the role of the eccentric Madame Arcati, including Penelope Keith, Stephanie Cole, Angela Lansbury and, most recently, Jennifer Saunders. Coward himself once stepped in to play Charles and John Gielgud took on the role during an early ENSA tour. The play has been revived countless times around the world, proving its enduring charm and brilliance.

In 2004, Charles Spencer wrote in *The Daily Telegraph*: "With *Hay Fever* and *Private Lives*, *Blithe Spirit* is one of Coward's three indisputable comic masterpieces. Its irreverent treatment of mortality gives the piece an irresistible energy."

What is truly remarkable about *Blithe Spirit* is that it was written during one of the darkest periods of the Second World War, when loss and grief were rampant. And yet, here was a play that dared to make light of death itself. It could only have been born from such times, and the laughter it inspired remains just as infectious today. It has been an absolute joy to bring it to life.

Russell Fleet - Sound Designer

She has a particular interest in costuming shows for the period from 1920 to 1960.

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
