

The club is open six nights a week and Sunday lunchtimes, and is managed and staffed entirely by volunteers.



YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU

by George S. Kaufman and Moss Hart

YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU

Welcome to the enchanting world of *You Can't Take It With You*, written by George S. Kaufman and Moss Hart, where the whimsical and heartwarming tale of the Sycamore family unfolds amidst the backdrop of the 1930s.

Moss Hart (1904 – 1961) was a highly regarded playwright, director and author known for his many contributions to American theatre, directing many successful Broadway productions. He grew up in poverty but found his passion for the stage at a young age. His career took off with the success of his collaborations with George S. Kaufman, Irving Berlin and Cole Porter to name a few. Hart's ability to collaborate with a diverse range of composers and writers showcased his versatility as a director. Besides plays, he also penned memoirs, including *Act One* detailing his early life and rise in the theatre world. He had a talent for both comedic and dramatic works.

George S. Kaufman (1889 – 1961) was a prominent playwright, director and humourist, known for his sharp wit and prolific contributions to American theatre. His career spanned several decades, and he collaborated with various writers, including Edna Ferber and Moss Hart. Kaufman's works often satirised society, politics and human behaviour, earning him acclaim for his comedic prowess and insightful commentary.

Moss Hart and George S. Kaufman met through a chance encounter in 1930. Hart, an aspiring playwright at the time, was introduced to Kaufman by a mutual friend, playwright Laurence Stallings, during a poker game. This meeting marked the beginning of their influential creative collaboration. Kaufman, already an established and successful playwright, took an interest in Hart's work, and their shared passion for theatre led to a fruitful partnership in the world of Broadway.

Both Hart and Kaufman were key figures in the Golden Age of Broadway, leaving a significant impact on American theatre. Despite their different backgrounds, their partnership produced memorable plays that continue to be performed and admired in the world of theatre. Their collaborative works, including *The Man Who Came to Dinner, Merrily We Roll Along* and *Once in a Lifetime*, showcased their ability to blend humour, wit and social commentary, resonating with audiences and critics alike. Their plays often tackled societal norms, family dynamics and the human condition, reflecting the zeitgeist of their era. Together, they crafted *You Can't Take It With You*,

which premiered in 1936 and won the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 1937. It was made into a movie in 1938 and won two Academy Awards – Best Picture and Best Director for Frank Capra.

By highlighting the transient nature of material possessions compared to the lasting impact of joyful experiences and genuine relationships, *You Can't Take It With You* prompts reflection on what truly brings fulfilment and happiness in life; the themes of individuality, pursuing passions and the value of relationships over material wealth. Its relevance today lies in its reminder to prioritise experiences, relationships and personal fulfilment over the pursuit of wealth or material possessions, especially in a world often focused on consumerism and material success. It encourages living a fulfilling life rather than solely chasing monetary gains.

Within this captivating play, audiences will immerse themselves in the extraordinary life of the Sycamores, a family that defies convention and revels in individuality. At the helm of this delightful household stands the spirited patriarch, Grandpa Vanderhof, leading his kin through a joyous existence that bucks societal norms. Prepare to step into their unconventional abode, where a vibrant tapestry of characters awaits, each painted with their own distinctive quirks, passions and endearing idiosyncrasies.

The story takes an intriguing turn when Alice, the most conventional member of the Sycamore clan, extends an invitation to her affluent, conservative boyfriend and his parents for a dinner gathering. This collision of two starkly contrasting worlds sets the stage for uproarious laughter, delightful chaos and unforeseen connections.

You Can't Take It With You is more than a mere theatrical presentation; it's an open invitation to escape into a realm where laughter reigns supreme and the celebration of love and individuality knows no bounds. Jenny Richardson - Costume Designer


