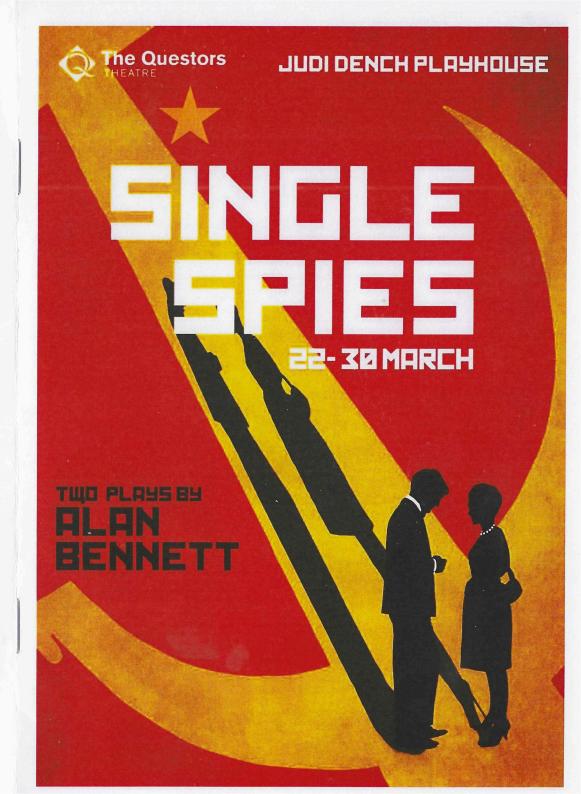

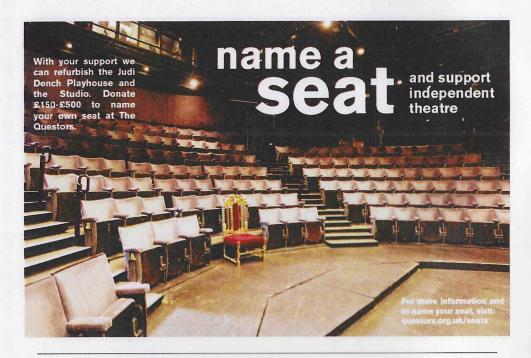

SINGLE SPIES

Two plays by Alan Bennett

The Judi Dench Playhouse

22 - 30 March 2024

SINGLE SPIES

It's not hard to understand the appeal that the Cambridge spies of the 1930s and 1940s continue to exert on the British imagination. Their stories are set in the corridors of power in Westminster and Washington, and involve astounding acts of espionage, the systematic betrayal of close friends, and lots of sex – both gay and straight. Small wonder they still command the attention of novelists, playwrights and biographers.

There were five of them altogether, and four of these belonged to an elite group which had been raised to become part of the British ruling class. They had attended leading English public schools, and had been educated at a University that has supplied the United Kingdom with 14 of its Prime Ministers. One of them was even a cousin of the late Queen Mother.

Astoundingly, when they left University, they seemed to move effortlessly into the key institutions of the British Establishment: the Foreign Office, the BBC, Oxbridge and, in time, the Intelligence agencies.

In Single Spies – the title comes from the quotation from Hamlet, "When sorrows come, they come not single spies, but in battalions" – Alan Bennett relates two fascinatingly entertaining stories. The first, An Englishman Abroad is based on true events and the second, A Question of Attribution, is entirely fictional. In both he mixes his signature dry wit with rueful sadness.

An Englishman Abroad came out of a play Bennett had on in the West End in 1977. The play was called *The Old Country* and starred Alec Guinness, who played a Foreign Office defector now living in exile outside Moscow. In the course of the run of the play, various friends and well-wishers went backstage, often with reminiscences of similar spies, like Guy Burgess and Kim Philby. The most notable of these was Coral Browne who, at the time, Bennett did not know but who told him about meeting Guy Burgess in Moscow in 1958 and of the particular incidents that make up this play.

The picture of the elegant actress and the seedy exile sitting in a dingy Moscow flat for a long afternoon listening again and again to Jack Buchanan singing "Who stole my heart away?" seemed to Bennett funny and sad. But it was a few years before he got to writing it up. It was only when he sent the first draft to Coral Browne that he found that she had kept not merely Burgess' letters thanking her for running him errands but also her original notes of his measurements and even his cheque, uncashed and for £6/0s/0d, to treat her and one of her fellow actors to lunch at Le Caprice.

Burgess longed to come back to England. He wasn't allowed to because it was never plain what he could have been charged with and he might well have compromised too many of his former associates in the Foreign Office.

A Question of Attribution is a play about Sir Anthony Blunt who, as Surveyor of The Queen's Pictures, was personal art adviser to Queen Elizabeth II. In 1964, after being offered immunity from prosecution, Blunt confessed to having been a spy for the Soviet Union. His confession - a closely guarded secret for years - was revealed publicly by Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher in November 1979 and he was stripped of his knighthood. It was at that point that, on spec, Bennett made some notes of the kind of conversation Blunt and The Queen might have had as he was hanging a picture in Buckingham Palace. This later became the heart of the play Bennett wrote for The National Theatre in 1988. The painting at the centre of the play is actually a painting in the Royal Collection; A Triple Portrait attributed to Titian. Originally the painting had only included two figures. Cleaning revealed a third figure. An X-ray revealed a fourth figure and when the painting was revolved there was the shadow of a fifth figure. The analogy with the Cambridge Spies seemed obvious to Bennett. So, the first two figures stand in for the original two defectors, Burgess and Maclean, and the third figure the next defector, Kim Philby. The fourth figure is Blunt and the fifth figure is ... well, who knows?

It was this painting and related historical matters which provided the framework of the play, though the deeply ambiguous conversation. The Queen has with Blunt is at its heart. Blunt himself remained a fascinating figure; hated by some of his colleagues, adored by others. Bennett admits that he never met or even saw him but, as with Burgess, he felt more kindly towards him because he made such good jokes.

In my researches into the protagonists of both plays, the following works have proved invaluable, not just for their fascinating and detailed content but for the easily accessible style in which they are written.

Stalin's Englishman - The Lives of Guy Burgess by Andrew Lownie

Anthony Blunt: His Lives by Miranda Carter

Coral Browne - This Effing Lady by Rose Collis

And, of course, Bennett's own writings and diaries, *Writing Home, Untold Stories* and *Keeping On Keeping On* are deep wells of priceless, sparkling anecdotes and observations.

Biographies

Carol Fullilove - Coral Browne

Carol joined The Questors as an acting member in 2000. Her many productions include *The Birthday Party, A Memory of Water, Playhouse Creatures, Look Back in Anger, A View from the Bridge, The Village Bike, The Effect, King Charles III, Little Dorrit, Dead Boy Café and The Herd.*

Simon Roberts - Guy Burgess

Simon's previous roles at The Questors include Lopakhin in *The Cherry Orchard*, Vladimir in *Waiting for Godot*, Ray Say in *Little Voice* and Solness in *The Master Builder*. His adaptation of Patrick Hamilton's novel *The Slaves of Solitude* will receive its premiere at The Questors in May.

Dumitru Stratulat – Tolya

Dumitru has been part of The Questors for six years – first in Student Group 73 and now as an acting member. He appeared in the panto *King Arthur and the Twelfth Knight*, and plays such as *Quietus*, *An Invitation to Three Murders* and *The Physicists*.

Simon Higginson – Tailor

Simon has been a member of The Questors for 40 years, and *Single Spies* is his 29th production – which include *Abigail's Party, ENRON*, *The Ladykillers, Dear Brutus* and a couple of pantos; most recently having a ball in *Treasure Island*.

Craig Nightingale - Shop Assistant

Craig took part in the Student Group in 1983 and went on to study acting in England and France. He recently rejoined The Questors, and this is his third show following *The White Carnation* (Sir Horace Duncan) and *The Physicists* (Newton). Craig has worked extensively in theatre and television in the UK and Austria.

Francis Lloyd - Anthony Blunt

Francis has been an actor and director at The Questors for nearly 30 years. Parts include Vanya (*Uncle Vanya*), Henry Carr (*Travesties*), Dr Wicksteed (*Habeas Corpus*) and, more recently, Victor (*Private Lives*) and Pierrepoint (*Hangmen*). The last play he directed was *The White Carnation* and he will be directing Noel Coward's *Blithe Spirit* at the beginning of next season.

Dan Dawes - Restorer

Dan worked in theatre for ten years, co-founding the company Idle Discourse, and now works as a narrative designer in the gaming industry. He has worked on multiple plays at The Questors as an actor or director. He also ran Questival, a bi-annual new writing festival, was the Director of Studies for the Acting for All classes and sat on the Board of Trustees.

Adam Kimmel - Chubb

Adam was last seen at The Questors as Gordon in *Neville's Island*. Before that, he was Roberto in *Death and the Maiden*, Robert in *Blue/Orange*, Major Steve Arnold in *Taking Sides* and Peter in *The Last of the Haussmans*. Prior to The Questors, he performed in numerous plays on the London Fringe and on tour.

Quinn Goodliffe - Phillips

Quinn's first part at The Questors was in *The Duchess of Malfi* in 2014 and he attended Questors Youth Theatre. He has been acting here ever since including in Shakespeare, panto and new plays. He has also directed productions, most recently at the QWho event.

Dominic Reed - Colin

Single Spies is Dominic's first production at The Questors. He has appeared in A Dream Play at Tower Theatre and in New Stagers' production of The House Amongst the Willows. He gained acting experience with Acting Coach Scotland and the Tron Theatre Glasgow. He is a published writer, with stories in Thi Wurd, Flash Frontier and The Los Angeles Review. He was shortlisted for the 2020 Alpine Fellowship Writing Prize and won third prize in the 2021 Fractured Lit Flash Fiction prize.

Kate Langston – HMQ

Kate joined The Questors in 2003. Most recently she has been seen as Amanda in *Private Lives* and Beatrice in *Much Ado About Nothing*.

Simon Meadon - Director

Simon is returning to The Questors after a thirty year absence, during which time he produced over fifty West End and Broadway shows. His previous Questors directing and co-directing credits include *Lark Rise*, *Marat/Sade*, *On the Razzle*, *Too Clever by Half* and *A Lovely Sunday for Creve Coeur*.

Bron Blake - Set Designer

Bron has been a member since the early 1970s, doing set design and scenic art since 2004. Specialising in period shows from the 1920s to 1950s, Nichola has been the costume designer on over 30 shows in the last 20 years, including Shadowlands, Present Laughter, Blue Remembered Hills, Mrs Warren's Profession, Much Ado About Nothing and The White Carnation.

Mark White - Lighting Designer

Mark has been lighting stages, people and other surfaces for over four decades. He is a Professional Member of the Association of Lighting Production and Design, and sits on the Executive Committee. He was a recipient of the Knights of Illumination Award for a Lifetime Achievement in Lighting Design in 2009.

Doug Willis - Stage Manager

Since joining The Questors, Doug has worked in various stage management roles. In the last few years, he has been the Stage Manager for the productions of *Apologia* and *A Doll's House*.

Sarah Clopet - Deputy Stage Manager

Sarah has been involved in The Questors over 16 years covering most aspects of backstage work including set construction, scenic painting, lighting and sound, assistant, deputy and stage management. Her most recent plays as deputy stage manager or stage manager are *The Physicists, Albion, Much Ado About Nothing* and *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof.*

Joanna Mludzinska - Properties

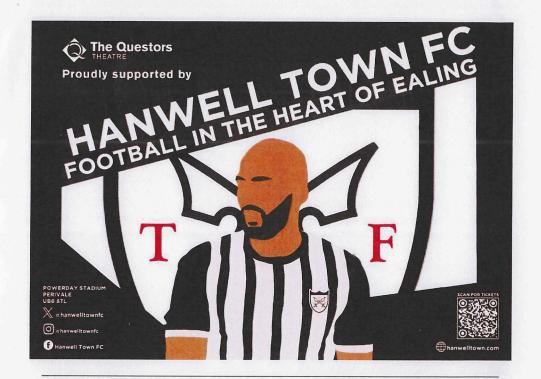
