THE STUDENT GROUP— WHAT IT IS AND HOW IT WORKS

The Questors Student Group was first started in 1946 as a part-time training course for amateur actors and actresses of promising talent who wished to join The Questors main acting group. The idea of the Group grew out of the training work the theatre had been doing for some years previously with its acting members. In the first year the Group was staffed by members of The Questors and, the scope of the course being limited by that consideration, classes were held once a week, on Saturday afternoons.

Having established the course, and its value, The Questors approached the Middlesex County Council with plans for a somewhat more extensive year's course. These proposals were accepted by the County Education Committee, and since then the course has been run under the auspices of the County Council, as part of its adult education work. For three years a new Group was formed each year and given a year's preliminary training, with three classes a week. Their year's work culminated in the production respectively of "The Pleasure Garden," "The Confederacy" and "Miss Elizabeth Bennet."

As a result of the experience gained it was felt, a year ago, that the time had come when the course could usefully be extended to two years. Proposals to that effect having been submitted to and adopted by the County Education Committe, a Second Year Group was formed last September as well as a new First Year Group.

The Second Year Group have four classes a week—an hour's Speech Class, an hour's Movement Class, and 4½ hours' rehearsal (additional rehearsals are also held as necessary). For the first term and a half they were working on the four one-act plays presented here in February; since then they have been working on "The Women Have Their Way." At the rehearsal classes are under the direction of Miss Dorothy Dickinson. For the cast of "The Women Have Their Way," the Group has been supplemented by several members of The Questors main acting group.

The First Year Group have three classes a week—an hour's Movement Class, $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours' Speech Class (to enable more individual attention to be given, the class of 16 is divided into two for the Speech Class), and $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours' Acting class, at which the work consists largely of acting exercises,

improvisations, etc. "Riders to the Sea" has been cast from members of the First Year Group, who have rehearsed the play under the direction of Miss Pamela Richards, in addition to their regular class work.

Of the present First Year Group a selection of about ten members will be made to join the Second Year Group for the coming year, while a new First Year Group is being formed. Applications for membership of the First Year Group are invited, and particulars may be obtained on application to the Theatre Manager, or from one of the stewards or programme sellers.

The staff of the Student Group consists, in addition to Miss Dickinson, of Miss Anny Boalth (Movement), Miss Mollie Coldicott (Speech), Mr. Francis W. Smith (Make-up), and Mr. Alfred Emmet (Acting), with Miss Pamela Richards as Manager.

ABOUT THE PLAY

"The Women have their Way" was written by the Quintero brothers in the early part of this century and is characteristic of their work. Nothing could be further from the dark passions of the plays of Garcia Lorca, which to our northern eyes seem typical of Spain. Here we see a simple picture of life in a little Andalusian town, with the theme of the individual versus society, that pet of problem playwrights, here turned to laughter.

The Spanish critic Azorin (who calls this play its authors' masterpiece) writes, "They seem always to be asking themselves 'Is right on the side of the one or of the many?' They study the social scene in all its detail, perceptively, painstakingly, bringing all sorts of men and women into their picture. But they sway to the end between those two points of view; and if their own standpoint seems to reflect a certain mild scepticism, it reflects pity and sympathy too . . . Nothing that the Quinteros have to say will be pretentiously thrust upon us. We may think, mistakenly, that they have nothing to say, but if we will but surrender our minds to the simple story, and let our imaginations absorb the very homely picture, we shall find life interpreted there."
