"THE RIVER LINE"

It is well known that the play was preceded by the book of the same name. The play is not, however, an adaptation of the book since the author says that only when the book had been published did he realize that the subject was more suited to a play than a novel. It is evident, therefore, that in the play the author realizes his intentions more fully.

Several themes are developed. The Old Europe is contrasted vividly with the New America, Morgan's own philosophies of peace and war are expounded, and over and above all this, a gripping story of the French Resistance Movement holds the play in a strong, unsentimental framework.
