ABOUT THE PLAY

"GHOSTS" was first produced in this country on Friday, March 13th, 1891, the opening production of J. T. Grein's famous "Independent Theatre." Few plays can have been greeted with such almost universal execration: a typical press comment read: "... the play should be buried beneath a garbage heap, and a monument of filth raised to mark the spot where it lies."

But even since the play became sufficiently respectable to qualify for the Lord Chamberlain's licence (in 1914), the more "sensational" aspects of the play's subject matter and story, such as venereal disease and Oswald's madness, have still tended to distract an audience's attention away from its real theme. "Ghosts . . . old, worm-eaten ideas, beliefs long thought dead—they go on and on . . . and we can't get rid of them. . . . And we here, every one of us, is terrified of the light." That is a theme with an importance as great today as when the play was written.

Perhaps it is only now, when what used to seem sensational is taken as a matter of course, that the theme can communicate itself clearly to an audience.
