This is not the first time that James Saunders and David Campton have shared the same programme, as it happened in 1961 at the Dublin Festival and subsequently the Comedy Theatre, in an evening of comedies of menace, in company with Harold Pinter.

JAMES SAUNDERS has been represented in previous Festivals. In 1960 we presented a group of his one act plays under the title "Ends and Echoes," which included "Barnstable," his play in the programme referred to above. For last year's Festival we commissioned "Next Time I'll Sing to You," now running at the Criterion Theatre and due to open in New York in the autumn. Also we produced "Double Double" earlier this year, and toured it to local schools; this has since been heard on radio under the title "Gimlet" and seen on television as "Just You wait." James Saunders' first full length play, "The Ark," was produced at the Westminster Theatre in 1959 and later in a revised version at Scarborough by Stephen Joseph's theatre-in-the-round, which also first produced "Alas! Poor Fred."

"The Pedagogue" was written especially for this Festival and for the actor who plays it. "Who was Hilary Maconochie," described as an English play for foreigners, was originally written for a performance in Brussels.

James Saunders was born in Islington in 1925, and lives in Ealing with his wife and three children.

DAVID CAMPTON has been writing plays from an early age. He became a fully professional writer, under contract to Associated Rediffusion, in 1956, writing various television programmes, episodes in serials and comedy scripts. As a playwright his work has mostly been introduced by Stephen Joseph's company, with which he has been associated as an actor since 1957. He acted in his own "Four Minute Warning" when that company brought it to The Questors Theatre in 1961.

He was born in 1924 in Leicester, where he still lives.
