

About the authors

A.E. ELLIS is the author of the novel 'The Rack' of which Graham Greene wrote: "There are certain books which we call great for want of a better term, that rise like monuments above the cemeteries of literature: 'Clarissa Harlowe'..... 'Great Expectations'..... 'Ulysses'. 'The Rack' to my mind is of this company." The production of his controversial play *Grand Manoevres* at the National Theatre in 1975 prompted J.W. Lambert to comment: ".....the tone of irrational hatred with which it has been greeted is in itself a remarkable illustration of the play's point." He described it as "A savage picture of human nature at its communal worst, easily corrupted by a handful of vicious individuals: presented at the Old Vic with a force and vivacity which provided their own antidote and deserved a more intelligent reception." *Seagull Rising* was written (or rather wrote itself) during negotiations for the production of *Grand Manoeuvres*. Ellis is presently engaged in further playwriting as well as a history of the Dreyfus Affair.

MICHAEL MORIARTY has been a Questors member for some six years during which time he has been a member of Questabout, The Questors Theatre-in-Education group, has worked as both actor and director and has put his musical talents to good use. He is a one-time teacher who subsequently took up computer programming (and gave that up with some relief) and *Early Shakespeare and the Late Marlowe* is his first and only play. He is not certain about future plans but hopes to write more plays.

PAUL RAMSEY was born and bred in Aldeburgh, Suffolk, but has lived and worked in America for the last few years as an actor, giving performances of his own work. He also writes operatic libretti for modern composers. His other work includes the intriguingly-titled *Songs and Dances of Pontius Pilate*.
