

SOPHOCLES, the Athenian tragic dramatist, was born in 496 B.C. He has been described as the consummate dramatic artist, the inventor of plot and the creator of character. He lived for 90 years and observed some of the most important events in human civilisation: when he was young Athens was young in democracy; in his youth she was defending it against the might of Persia; in his old age Greece was divided by the contrary ideals of state-craft and ambition for power that led to the Peloponnesian War.

Sophocles is said to have written over a hundred plays, of which seven are extant. He wrote for a theatre very different from our own; not a place of entertainment eight times a week, but a series of annual festivals, the main one held in the Spring, when a cycle of dramatic performances promoted civic splendour and religious ritual.

In *Electra* Sophoclean detachment is pushed to extremes as it presents with consummate skill and dramatic irony the story of Electra and Orestes, sister and brother, who triumph against their enemies, though one of them happens to be their mother. Their harsh judgement, which allows for no place for guilt or grief at this horrendous crime, is shown by Sophocles as an end in itself. It is on Electra, as the title implies, that the principal focus of attention in the play falls, and its bleakness is relieved by the psychological insight and human sympathy displayed in the portrait of this heroine.

When the bloody conclusion is reached the Chorus state: '...
Now at last your sufferings are ended. You have won your own deliverance'.

Olwen WYMARK was born in America, and was married to actor Patrick Wymark until his death in 1970. She has worked with the Unicorn Theatre for Young People, London, the Tricycle Theatre, and held the appointment of Lecturer in Playwriting at New York University.

She has written more than three dozen plays for radio, television and the stage. Two years ago the Questors Theatre Student Group performed Find Me, a documentary play about a mentally disturbed girl. The action takes place in Brindsley Miller's apartment in South Kensington, London. 9.30 on a Sunday night.

Peter SHAFFER was born in Liverpool in 1926. Between attending St Paul's School, London, and Trinity College, Cambridge he was conscripted as a coal-miner. He worked in the New York Public Library, for Boosey and Hawkes in London and later as a literary and music critic.

His plays seem remarkable for their variety of subject: Five Finger Exercise (1958) naturalistically set within a family; The Royal Hunt of the Sun (1964) a magnificent epic depicting the Spanish conquest of Peru and the personal confrontation between Pisarro and Atahualpa; Black Comedy (1965) arguably the most successful modern farce; Equus (1973, and presented at Questors in March 1982), reflecting the moral dilemma of a psychiatrist; and currently Amadeus, which gives a different perspective to Mozart and his music.

Black Comedy highlights the insignificance of social conventions as its characters stumble, in more ways than one, in the dark!

THE QUESTORS STUDENT GROUP provides a two year parttime training course for actors, which is intended to prepare them for membership of the theatre's main acting group. The Course, which is run under the auspices of the Ealing Education Committee, is now in its 36th year. A large proportion of The Questors' acting strength started in the Student Group (and some of the Student Group started in our Young People's Groups, one or two of them from the age of about 6 or 7). It is an intensive course, calling for a high degree of commitment. Selection for the First Year Group is by audition, with usually some 60 applications for 20 to 24 places. At the end of the first year a further selection is made for the Second Year Group of 10 to 12 students. Their intensity of work is very high, averaging up to 10 to 15 hours a week for the 40 weeks of the Course. Tonight you are seeing the current Second Year Group's first production as a group. They will then continue to train and to work for their final production next July in the main theatre.
