

THE AUTHOR - JAMES SAUNDERS

James Saunders was born in London in 1925. His stage plays include Alas Poor Fred (1959); Next Time I'll Sing to You (which won the Evening Standard Award for the Most Promising Play in 1963); A Scent of Flowers (1964); The Italian Girl (1967); The Travails of Sancho Panza (1969); Games and After Liverpool (1971); Hans Kohlhaas (1972); Bye Bye Blues (1973); The Island (1975); and Bodies (1977). For television he wrote six adaptations of stories by D.H. Lawrence for Granada in 1965; three plays for the series Country Matters for Granada in 1971/2, and four episodes of The Avenue based on a novel by R.M. Delderfield for London Weekend Television in 1978. He also wrote a BBC comedy series, Bloomers, which starred the late Richard Beckinsale. He wrote the screenplay of The Sailor's Return, directed by Jack Gold and starring Tom Bell. He has also written a number of plays for radio.

He has been a Questors Member for many years and plays he has specially written for The Questors are Next Time I'll Sing to You; The Pedagogue; Neighbours; Hans Kohlhaas, and The Island.

Other plays first performed at The Questors: the trilogy Ends and Echoes; Alas Poor Fred; After Liverpool; The Borage Pidgeon Affair, and The Girl in Melanie Klein.

THE DIRECTOR - LARRY IRVIN

Larry Irvin has been a member of The Questors since 1957. His long association with the plays of James Saunders started in 1962 when he created the part of Meff in Next Time I'll Sing to You. The following year he played The Pedagogue which was specially written for him, and in 1969 Sear in The Borage Pidgeon Affair. He has also acted in A Scent of Flowers and Alas Poor Fred and in 1977 he adapted and directed James Saunders's radio play Random Moments in a May Garden which had its first stage production in The Questors Studio.

Other Saunders plays he has directed are *The Girl in Melanie Klein* which had its World Première at this theatre. Last year his production of *Hans Kohlhaas* represented The Questors at the Edinburgh Festival. His most recent stage appearances for The Questors were as Archie Rice in *The Entertainer* and Lord Brockhurst in *The Boy Friend*.

THE PLAYERS

JO ARUNDEL

Since joining The Questors in 1950, she has played many leading roles, appearing in *The Birthday Party*, *Old Times*, *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf? Venus Observed*, *Hay Fever*, *The Entertainer* and *Sisters*, which was her last appearance here.

In plays by James Saunders she has appeared in Barnstable, Alas Poor Fred and created the roles of Lizzie in Next Time I'll Sing to You and Jo in The Island.

JILLYANN HEALY

Her roles at The Questors have included Lady Macbeth, and Hedda in Hedda Gabler. Other appearances have been in As You Like It, Cymbeline, Present Laughter, Mother Courage, What The Butler Saw and The Ride Across Lake Constance. She has been with the company since 1960.

PETER HEALY

With The Questors he played the title role in *Macbeth* and has been with the company since 1962. Other appearances were in *Henry Fourth* by Pirandello, *Big Soft Nelly, What The Butler Saw, Equus, No Man's Land* and *The Ride Across Lake Constance*.

MICHAEL HEALY

His appearances since 1966 have included Pirandello's Henry Fourth, Othello, Betrayal and Hedda Gabler.

SET DESIGNER

DAVID GILBERT

A member of The Questors for the past five years during which time he has designed for the productions of *Home, A Man for All Seasons, Playground, Orestes, Pygmalion, Separate Tables*, and *The Accrington Pals*.

Bodies was first commissioned and premièred by The Orange Tree, in Richmond, in 1977. A year later, a revised version was produced at the Hampstead Theatre, and it was this production which opened some months later in the West End, to wide acclaim.

Bernard Levin, then critic at *The Sunday Times*, returned to the production again and again in his column. In Saunders's writing Levin perceived hope and optimism and faith in the human spirit.
