

C.P. Taylor was born in Glasgow in 1929 and wrote for the theatre from the early 1960's. His work was for a wide range of audiences: community theatre, the West End, studio and regional theatre as well as working both in television and radio.

Among his plays are *Bandits* which was staged by the R.S.C. in its opening season at the Warehouse, 1977. And a Nightingale Sang, which played at the Queen's Theatre, London, 1980, *Bread and Butter*, Nottingham and London, 1969, *Black and White Minstrels*, Hampstead Theatre Club, 1972, and *Good*, R.S.C. Warehouse, 1982.

Just as his work was achieving national recognition, Cecil Taylor died at the tragically early age of 52 on 10th December 1981.
