DIRECTOR'S NOTE

The Matchmaker (a re-written version of The Merchant of Yonkers) is based on a comedy by Johann Nestroy, Einen Jux will er sich machen (Vienna, 1842). A good deal of academic scholarship has been done comparing the two plays but The Matchmaker, Wilder says, is about quite different matters from Nestroy's play: "My play is about aspirations of the young (and not only of the young) for a fuller, freer, participation in life".

Towards the end of the 1920's Thornton Wilder began to lose pleasure in the theatre. He felt that the theatre of his time simply aimed to be soothing to the rising middle classes. The conventional proscenium stages removed, cut off and boxed the action, creating a theatre which could not disturb its audience in any way. The tragic had no heat, the comic had no bite, the social criticism failed to indict the audience with responsibility. In his plays, Our Town and The Skin of Our Teeth Wilder experimented with new methods of production which did away with realistic settings. The Matchmaker was written to parody the 'nonsense of 19th century staging', which Wilder had seen in the Stock Company plays at Ye Liberty Theatre, Oakland, California. Paradoxically, this intention has often been ignored and the play received the ultimate accolade paid to any stock company 19th century play: it was made into the Broadway and Hollywood musical Hello Dolly.

THE STUDENT GROUP

The first Questors Student Training Course for Actors was started in 1947. A new Group has been formed every year since then, to run under the same direction. This is a 2-Year Course, aimed at giving preliminary training for amateur actors and preparing them for membership of the main acting group of The Questors Theatre. Between 20 and 24 students are generally enrolled for the First Year Course, selected by audition from some 60 applicants. At the end of the first year, there is a further process of selection to make up the Second Year Group, whose final production you are seeing this evening.

The Course makes great demands on the Students. In the first year there are 5½ hours of classes every week for 36 weeks, including Speech, Movement, Acting and Make-up. In the second year, the intensity of work steps up greatly, with 7½ hours of regular classes each week and many hours of additional rehearsals for the two productions given by the Group during the year, the first of which was the programme of short plays given in the Studio Theatre in February.

The Course therefore demands a very high standard of commitment and enthusiasm and a great sense of loyalty to the Group. Without that, a student will not make the grade, but with it, will learn how to make a valuable and rewarding contribution to the life of the theatre. More than one third of the present acting members of The Questors had their initial training in our Student Group.

The Training Course is run under the auspices of the Ealing Education Committee. A new Second Year Group is now being formed from those who have just completed their first year and applications are being invited for the new First Year Course to start in September.

The minimum age for the Student Course is 18. The Questors also run an 'Introductory Group' for 17-year olds, likewise selected by audition. For this, the class time is only 3 hours per week, but the personal commitment to the Group is just as high.
