

Noël Coward began his career as a child actor in 1911. When he appeared as a dramatist with comedies like *The Young Idea* and *Fallen Angels* he was hailed at once as the spokesman of the younger generation of the early 1920s and his plays were often roundly condemned as immoral. But it was after *Hayfever* in 1925 that Coward produced his best work with elegant high comedies in the tradition of Congreve and Wilde. *Fumed Oak* is an unusual departure for Coward in that it attempts to portray the lives of a lower middle class family. When it was first produced in 1936, Noël Coward and Gertrude Lawrence played Henry and Doris Gow.

The Real Inspector Hound was first staged in 1968 at the National Theatre and was hailed as the ultimate parody of the stage and literary convention of the country house mystery. Interestingly the critics of this play are more often seen to be in competition with those within it. The Observer said of it "It's an object of pure virtuoso craft and display as luxuriously self-sufficient as a netsuke or Fabergé Easter Egg. But it's nearly perfect in its kind as a P.G. Wodehouse plot; tiny, ludicrous and beautiful as an ivory Mickey Mouse . . . It's time we stopped dismissing comedy as an inferior genre".

THE QUESTORS STUDENT GROUP provides a two year part-time training course for actors, which is intended to prepare them for membership of the theatre's main acting group. The Course, which is run under the auspices of the Ealing Education Committee is now in its 37th year. A large proportion of The Questors' acting strength started in the Student Group (and some of the Student Group started in our Young People's Groups, one or two of them from the age of about 6 or 7). It is an intensive course, calling for a high degree of commitment. Selection for the First Year Group is by audition, with usually some 60 applications for 20 to 24 places. At the end of the first year a further selction is made for the Second Year Group of 10 to 12 students. Their intensity of work is very high, averaging up to 10 to 15 hours a week for the 40 weeks of the Course. Tonight you are seeing the current Second Year Group's first production as a group. They will then continue to train and to work for their final production next July in the main theatre.
