

"THE HISTORY OF TOM JONES, A FOUNDLING"

Novel by Henry Fielding (1704-54), published in 1749, reprinted almost at once and published again in a revised edition in the following year. Undoubtedly Fielding's masterpiece, it is faultlessly plotted and brilliantly characterised, with a warm and spirited heroine, a huge cast of tightly-drawn personalities and — most surprising for the time — an unheroic hero: a man with a generous heart, human faults and weaknesses, and a warmth which makes him welcome as everyone's friend.

The strength of a masterpiece can be guaged by the number of offshoots it produces . . .

Light opera by Edward German (1862-1936). First produced at The Duke of York's Theatre in September 1904.

"TOM JONES"

United Artists Motion Picture released in 1963. Screenplay by John Osborne, directed by Tony Richardson. Starred Albert Finney and Susannah York, with Hugh Griffith, Edith Evans, David Warner, Freda Jackson and Rachel Kempson in the cast. Won Academy Awards for best film, best direction, best music.

"TOM JONES"

A play in three acts commissioned by the Council of Repertory Theatres and by the theatres at Leatherhead, Colchester, Bromley and Salisbury. First presented at the Leatherhead Theatre 12th October 1965 with Christopher Bidmead as Tom and subsequently transferred to the Prince of Wales Theatre, under the title 'Beset by Women' in March 1966, starring Keith Barron.



THE QUESTORS THEATRE

Founded in 1929, The Questors has become one of the leading amateur theatres in Great Britain. The Questors has over 4,000 members and owns a large and valuable site in West London.

On this site, in 1964, a completely new, flexible playhouse was opened in the presence of Her Majesty, the Queen Mother. The playhouse is adaptable to thrust, arena or proscenium arch staging and was extremely advanced for its time. It has attracted interest from all parts of the world. In 1979, the Theatre celebrated its Golden Jubilee.

The Company is entirely amateur. It presents fourteen major productions each year in its main theatre, plus some eight Studio productions in its smaller workshop theatre.

As well as presenting a wide variety of plays, Questors plays host to visiting companies from home or abroad, mounts art exhibitions, runs several workshops and clubs for young people, as well as a two-year training course for actors and occasionally tours productions in this country and overseas. This year the Company is staging productions in both Edinburgh and Tokyo.

The Questors is a theatre club; therefore only members may purchase tickets at its London playhouse — but it's easy to join! The current subscription is £16.00. Students and those under 18 need only pay £6.00. All members are entitled to ten free seats per season for Questors productions.
