
THE ASPERN PAPERS

SAMUEL BECKETT (1906 - 1989)

SAMUEL BECKETT was born at Foxrock, south of Dublin, of thriving Protestant stock, on Friday 13th April: a Good Friday. He was educated at Trinity College, Dublin where his prowess on the cricket field has been recorded for posterity in Wisden. It was not only on the cricket field that he distinguished himself, for the authorities considered him bright enough to lecture to the École Normale Supérieure in Paris, where we find him in 1928. It was here he formed an early association with James Joyce for whom he was never to lose his admiration and reverence. They shared a love of Dante but not for the philosopher Descartes on whom Beckett was working at the time. Descartes exerted a considerable influence on Beckett and shaped his writing in the years to come. Descartes' dualism separated mind from body: the true life was in the mind. The body to which the mind is tied is, as with all animals, a machine. All machines are comic. Beckett decided to create imperfect buffoons of his men-machines or bodymachines.

Philosophers apart he appears to have been much influenced by the Dublin music-halls which he visited in his youth and his theatrical dialogue owes much to the comic cross-calk acts. His characters are often devoid of 'personality' possessing only the clown's self-conscious awareness that his sole function is to keep the game going. He is peculiarly sensitive to the idea that man is 'a scrap of life surrounded by death, a something encircled by nothing'. Yet at the same time he possesses the peculiarly irish faculty for giving this desolate vision a comic dimension.

In Waiting for Godot Beckett abandons conventional structure and development in both plot and dialogue in order to present a dramatic vision of the human predicament in which mankind seems to have no place.

Beckett was married in 1948. It was a childless marriage and although his wife was younger she predeceased him by only a year. He was awarded the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1969.

IRENE RUNAVKER

Irene studied at the Camberwell College of Art and spent two years lifedrawing with Merlyn Evans. She is a member of the Ridley Art Society and National Artists Association and recently taught painting at the Anglia Higher Education College, Cambridge.

The paintings in the exhibition arose from Irene's stay in a whitewalled village 2000 feet up in the mountains of Andalucia in Spain. The shocked landscape that Lorca and Picasso knew so well (and departed by murder and migration) confronted an urban, abstract artist. The geometry and anguish Lorca experienced visiting New York evoked a similar response in Irene Runayker in Andalucia.

We have been invited to perform our production of Waiting for Godot on the last night of the Fifth Glasgow International Drama Festival taking place at the Mitchell Theatre, Glasgow 24th - 29th September 1990.
