Noël Coward

Famed voice of the cocktail era's Bright Young Things, Noël Coward was in fact born into the "refined suburban poverty" of Teddington, Middlesex in 1899, son of a piano salesman.

He began acting in school and made his first professional appearance at age 12, after his family moved to Battersea (and later Clapham) to open a boarding house.

After playing the "boy pushing barrow" in a D.W. Griffiths film and producing his first one act-play, Coward was called to army duty in 1918 but received a medical discharge after 9 months.

In 1925 he hit it big with *On With The Dance, Fallen Angels* and *Hay Fever*. A director, actor, singer, songwriter, screenwriter and novelist, his other works include: *Cavalcade, Design for Living, Private Lives, Present Laughter, Blithe Spirit and In Which We Serve.*

During World War 2 he worked with the Bureau of Propaganda in France and later in liaison in propaganda work in the United States, also on tours for troops, hospitals, factories and for war charities.

Noël Coward died on the 26th March 1973 in St Mary, Jamaica.

This Happy Breed

Rehearsals for *This Happy Breed* stopped at the outbreak of war in 1939 and it was not produced until 1942. Of the show Coward said:

"This may be sheer escapism, but if I can make people laugh etc, maybe I am not doing so very badly...this is my job really, and will remain so through all wars and revolutions and carnage."

Coward's title comes from one of many literary sources to make much of England's island status, an image pointed to in the period "between the wars" as a symbol of isolation and status -The "Island at the End of the World"

"This royal throne of Kings, this scepter'd isle,
This earth of majesty, this seat of Mars,
This other Eden, demi-paradise,
This fortress built by Nature for herself
Against infection and the hand of war,
This happy breed of men, this little world,
This precious stone set in the silver sea,
Which serves it in the office of a wall,
Or as a moat defensive of a house,
Against the envy of less happy lands,
This blessed plot, this earth, this realm, this England.

Dolly West's Kitchen is all Ireland. The kitchen table is a place of welcome and a negotiating table.




The Dispute and The Legacy
