



# A Midsommer Nights Dream

What is the point of telling you about this play? It is probably the first Shakespeare play you ever attended, and you have probably been to at least two productions. It is also the most popular and most produced of his works. So I will talk a little about producing it from an actor and director's point of view. We have used the First Folio version, as I always do with Shakespeare's plays. It still includes the helpful clues for the actors. I have, as I usually do, chosen the uncut version (don't worry, it runs for two hours and 25 minutes including interval), and it flows. Of course some speeches could use a bit of trimming here and there, but who am I to muck around with the speech construction of the greatest playwright the world has seen? Here I differ from directors who claim there are problems and inconsistencies, which they take it on themselves to fix, in his plays.

This time, working through a Shakespeare play, I am noticing more differences between his actors and modern student actors. For example, modern actors are trained to read through a play and write down everything the characters say about themselves and everything other people say about them. They then map out the journey of the characters according to the events and relationships that affect them. Shakespeare's actors would have had their parts and the half cue line into their speeches. They would have formed their opinions solely on this, so in effect they could only play what they said. Now there are good points to this: they were you are staying true to their part and everything they needed to know about themselves is in their role. The missing part was the collaboration between the director and the other actors.

This does provide a clear objective line, though. I have noticed in rehearsal that actors allow their characters to read minds, as when Hermia and Demetrius torment Helena during the lovers' scenes. Helena laments:

... you must join in souls to mock me too? and:

Now I perceive they have conjoined all three To fashion this false sport in spite of me. and:

... when I turn my back,

Wink each at other; ...

I discovered that the actors have started to play what she says. These are her words and the original actor would have played this to the letter, as would the actors playing the other roles. The problem we were having was the modern actors were trying to play what they say and what Helena says. This was really confusing the matter, especially as she describes the others as winking at each other when she turns her back. Unless she has eyes in the back of her head, it must be all in her mind. Contemporary actors risk overcomplicating the text when Shakespeare has made it easier for them. He encouraged actors to react freshly to what was said to them whilst on stage. Now when this scene was first played, the actors performing Demetrius and Hermia would have been surprised at Helena's words and probably a bit confused.

To test this theory I am producing the first three acts of Hamlet in the Studio on January 18th 2009. The actors will work only from their cue script parts. They won't be able to work with anyone else before the day, in front of a live audience. So we hope you enjoy tonight's performance and I hope to see you again in January.


