## High Tea

High Tea is a drama about a middle-aged man, Tony, who has been diagnosed with a degenerative and life-limiting neurological condition, the impact of this on the decisions made on his behalf and those he is still able to make for himself. It explores his relationship with his wife, Julie, and his mother, Edith — and their relationship with each other. What would you do if you were told you had two years to live? What was probably always a tense relationship between Julie and her mother-in-law is tested to the limit as the dire consequences of Tony's illness become clearer. Inspired by events in the writer's life, the humour in the play provides light relief from the seriousness of the subject matter.

## George's Room

I first encountered George's Room in 1967 when it was broadcast live on ITV. Some years later, as a student of acting, I was cast as the man in a stage production and I am happy that after all these years The Questors has given me the opportunity to direct this excellent little piece. The TV production was criticised at the time for being a mere recording of a stage play. This may have been an accurate observation but if it had never been broadcast and had just remained a one-act stage play then how many people would ever have seen it? The piece is essentially a character study and needs to be seen in a format that brings the characters to the fore, rather than slick editing, excessive camera movements and weird camera angles. So what some saw as a flaw I see as the right approach even on television. I am indebted to long-standing Questors member, Mark Redrup, for informing me that Alan Clarke, who directed the TV production, was a member of The Questors and directed a number of productions here back in the 1960s. Simplicity of staging while concentrating on the two acting performances was my approach to the piece and I hope that I and my two actors, Freddy and Andy, have managed to do justice to Owen's play.

## **Red Peppers**

Red Peppers takes us back to the world of Variety Theatre. In the 1930s, the country's favourite entertainers were performing their routines to packed houses all over the country.

The big names who topped the bill were the pop stars of the day. Variety survived into the post-war era, but was plundered by television, looking for stars. And ultimately TV proved to be its death. Today, *Red Peppers* provides a snapshot of life on and off stage for the entertainers who created this unique form of popular culture.

The play focuses on George and Lily Pepper, a husband and wife team who sing, dance and tell very bad jokes. They spend their time backstage bickering over their routines and complaining about their place on the bill. You wonder why they stay in the business, a couple of second-raters traipsing from one town to another, performing to a succession of audiences who give them the bird. Then you realise why they do it. It's their life; without Variety they have nothing.

So when everyone else turns on them, they forget their differences and pull together. You know exactly where they'll be this time next week. In another Northern mill town. Bolton or Bury, Oldham or Rochdale. Cheap lodgings and shabby dressing rooms. Steak and chips, and bottles of beer between the houses. And complaining about their place on the bill.

Noël Coward would have seen all this at first hand, having been introduced to the stage as a child performer. Considering he wrote the play eighty years ago, it holds up remarkably well today. It's a sharply-observed piece, and the script comes alive in performance.

Today, we are used to seeing fly-on-the-wall dramas on TV. Back in the thirties, this must have been an eye-opener for theatre-goers, exposing as it does the seedy backstage world of the Variety entertainers.
